



# Recognized vaccinations

The AXA supplementary outpatient insurance contributes to the costs of medically recognized preventive vaccinations in Switzerland, provided they are not covered by mandatory health insurance.

As of: April 01, 2026

The costs of the following vaccinations are covered by the AXA supplementary outpatient insurance:

- Travel vaccinations such as:
  - Yellow fever
  - Rabies
  - Japanese encephalitis
  - Typhoid fever (typhus abdominalis)
  - Cholera
- HPV outside the cantonal vaccination program
- Vaccinations/booster shots outside the official recommendations

The costs of the following vaccinations are covered by basic insurance (minus excess and deductible)\*:

- Tick vaccination (tick borne encephalitis)\*
- Measles, mumps, rubella (MMR)
- Chickenpox (varicella)
- Diphtheria and Tetanus
- Whooping cough (pertussis)\*
- Haemophilus influenzae type B (Hib)\*
- Pneumococcal infections\*
- Meningococcal A, C, W, Y\*
- Meningococcal B\*
- Poliomyelitis (polio)
- Hepatitis B\*
- Hepatitis A\* for special risk groups
- Cervical cancer (human papillomavirus, HPV) exclusively as part of the the cantonal vaccination program and only for individuals aged 11 to 26.
- Rabies (post-exposure)
- Flu vaccine (influenza)\*
- Covid-19\*
- Herpes zoster\*
- Mpox\*
- Rotavirus\*
- RSV (Respiratory Syncytial Viruses)\*

\* The detailed criteria for coverage are defined in the official [“Reference document on preventive vaccinations”](#) and vary depending on the vaccination. Please consult your doctor to determine whether the vaccination is medically recommended and whether it can be billed to your health insurance.

Important: Basic insurance does not cover vaccinations for occupational or travel-related reasons.

As of January 1, 2026, all vaccinations listed in the reference document will be exempt from the deductible; however, the excess will still be deducted.
